Woods unsure about **Masters**

Tiger Woods is still no closer to knowing whether he will be able to play in next month's US Masters as he struggles with back pain.

The world No. 1 withdrew from last week's Arnold Palmer Invitational in Florida because of his aching back and remains unsure if he will be fit for this year's first Major, starting on April 10 at Augusta National.

"For Augusta, it's actually a little too soon to be honest with you," he told reporters on Monday at a sponsorship announcement for the AT&T National.

"That's kind of the frustrating thing about this," he said. "I've

had a couple weeks off getting treatment, just working on trying to get ready for Augusta.

"As of right now, it's still too soon. As I said, it's very frustrating." Woods has never missed the Masters since he made his debut at Augusta National as an amateur in 1995. — Reuters.


